TRAVELER'S REPORT

My brothers, I would ask your indulgence for a few minutes and have you visualize the world as it was a mere century ago.

Many of the things that you would see would not be that surprising. The wonderful advances of our age had their birth and adolescence in the 19th and early 20th centuries. The great cities of the world, the worldwide communications, the marvels of technology that wrested the secrets of nature and improved the lives of countless millions that our ancestors were rightfully proud of still stand today and indeed have spread to every corner of the globe.

Our fraternity was in a golden age of recognition and respect. The world had just united to fight the Great War (WWI), and optimism in the United States was high as a result of the successful conclusion of that mighty endeavor. However, not all was right in that day. Due to the Great War and a worldwide flu pandemic, many of that generation had lost their lives, leaving a gap in the lives of the families left behind that needed to be filled.

Into this time, I would focus on one Brother. Frank S. Land was a young man in his late 20's who was active in his home Lodge of Ivanhoe #446 in Kansas City Mo. In addition to his activity with his Blue Lodge, he was an active member of the local Scottish Rite.

Brother Land was a diligent and kind man, and through his offices as Masonic Relief and Employment secretary, he was able to help many families during that turbulent time. As a result of his service, Brother Land would meet one young man who would change the course of his life: Louis Lermer. Louis was 16 years old, and had recently lost his father who was a member of Ivanhoe lodge. The Senior Warden of Ivanhoe asked Brother Land if he could find a place for Louis in his organization, as the youth needed to find a job to assist his family.

Brother Land met Louis, and was taken with his honesty, upright character and drive. As Brother Land got to know Louis better, he asked if he would like to start a club for young boys and meet at the Scottish Rite temple in Kansas City. Louis was enthusiastic about the idea, and gathered 8 friends together. This was in mid-February 1919, one century ago as I write this missive.

Brother Land took the boys on a tour of the Temple, and they got down to a discussion of what sort of organization they wished to build. Many suggestions were made, but the one that stuck was based on a request by Clyde Stream made to Brother Land, "Dad Land, tell us something connected with Masonry. They must have great names and we are meeting here in one of their buildings."

As Brother Land was that year the Commander of the DeMolai council of Kadosh, he told them the story of Jacques DeMolay, last Grand Master of the Order of the Poor Fellow-Soldiers of Christ and the Temple of Solomon, more commonly simply referred to as the Knights Templers or Order of the Temple. The story of the betrayal and eventual execution of DeMolay, and the destruction of the Order of the Temple inspired the boys with the implicit lessons of fidelity to your ideals, and faithfulness to your Brothers.



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That was on March 24, 1919, a date that the centenary will fall on during this coming month. When DeMolay was founded, the Order of the Temple creation was 800 years in the past and had been gone since 1314. However, due to the great lessons taught during its destruction, it lived on in Masonry, and from Masonry to inspire a new generation. We are now 900 years from the founding of the Order of the Temple, and yet today it has influence in the world through Masonry and DeMolay. As DeMolay reaches its first century, spreading across the world and having a long and distinguished list of members, from all disciplines and countries, we as Masons can reflect that light, that once kindled and nurtured, can change the world.

We pride ourselves on our core principle to make good men better. DeMolay exists to turn boys into good sons and good men. I encourage all Brothers to congratulate our fellow Brothers who sponsor and assist in DeMolay and to see what time and effort we personally could give to the great work of making boys into men.


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
